Temperatures

- Highs: 100-115° valley & foothills, 80-100° mountains
- Lows: Upper 60s – Mid 80s

Precautions

- ✓ Very high risk of heat stress or illnesses for entire population
- ✓ Stay hydrated
- ✓ Avoid being outdoors in the sun 10 am to 6 pm
- ✓ If you have access to air conditioning, use it. Fans may not be adequate
- ✓ Stay in a cool place especially during the heat of the day

On October 5th and 6th NorCal Tree Management will be completing tree work in the Rockridge Community - Unit 39. The Board of Directors are finalizing the specifications on the needed tree work in the Rockridge Community – Unit 44, this project will be scheduled soon and Management will provide additional details once the tree work has been scheduled. ■

Rockridge Communities Units 39 & 44

- All requests for common area repairs or services, including landscape services provided by Bianco Landscape Management, must be submitted through Management. Homeowners shall not contact vendors directly that are contracted with the Association.
- Common area spaces surrounding homes are not to be used as storage of any kind; including ladders, garbage cans, bikes and any other play equipment.
- All trees, shrubs, plants, etc. located in the common area surrounding homes are owned and maintained by the Whitney Oaks Community Association. To avoid enforcement action and/or reimbursement costs, please do not remove any existing landscaping or plant materials in those areas. ■

Most exterior projects on your home, including fence repairs and painting of homes, require the Architectural Committee's review and approval before work can commence. Whitney Oaks Golf Course

Over the past few months there have been several incidents of late-night vandalism due to trespassing on the Whitney Oaks Golf Club. Privately-owned golf carts and electric bikes have been used to damage several greens, bunkers, and maintenance equipment. Though the Golf Club is separately owned by UAIC (United Auburn Indian Council) it's a neighbor and an enhancement to our community – if you hear or see something please call the Rocklin Police Department.

Please note that the cart paths are owned and maintained by the Whitney Oaks Golf Club and their use is limited to paid golfers only. Whitney Oaks residents are trespassing and creating safety hazards when using the cart paths as running, walking/dog walking, biking trails, or to travel the community in private golf carts. Additionally, fishing is prohibited in the Golf Club ponds. ■

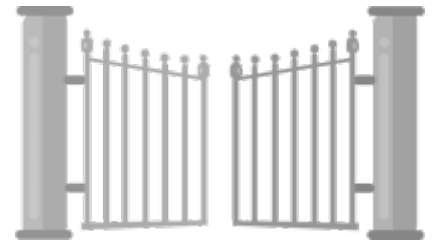

Whitney Oaks Wildlife Notes

If you have a bird feeder at your home, you are probably acquainted with the **Oak Titmouse**. It is a relatively small gray, brown-tinged bird with a noticeable tuft or crest on its head (see photo below). It is the only bird with a crest that I have seen in Whitney Oaks. Males and females are almost identical in appearance.

Oak titmice are found almost exclusively in California, and they reside here year-round. They prefer oak woodlands which explains why they are so common in Whitney Oaks. It has been reported that oak titmice numbers are declining in California as more and more oak woodlands are cut down to make room for urban development and as the “sudden oak death” disease spreads.

Oak titmice are attracted to bluebird nest boxes. In the spring I often see them going in and out of the bluebird boxes in our backyard. However, only two pair have successfully nested and produced young in our backyard in the last two decades. I suspect the somewhat larger, more territorial bluebirds have intimidated pairs from nesting at our home.

They nest primarily in April and May. Typically, five to six white eggs are incubated by the female over a 14–16 day period. Both parents feed the young, mostly insects. Offspring leave the nest 16-21 days after hatching and the parents continue to feed them for a while.

These perky little birds mate for life and are territorial so you will probably not see more than two in your yard at a time.
